

Hi we are so excited to be part of WWOOF Canada. We have space for up to 4 woofers, and are in need of immediate assistance, while the spring and summer are our busiest, we are working on a few of the postponed projects this fall and winter. 2019/2020Please note, that if you fly into Vancouver or Kelowna, there is a bus service to bring you to our town where we are happy to pick you up. Also, we will be lambing out mid to end of April 2020 so we will require a full contingent of 4 woofer who all need

to be here and aquanted with our protocol by the end of March. Our aim is to be an organically based, self sustainable Teaching Farm. We raise fibre animals Angora Rabbits, Cashmere & Angora Goats, high purity Gotland Sheep and in 2018 we Imported the first flock of Teeswater Sheep into Canada. We also grow small test plots of Cotton and soon Flax.Mark and I (Sue) both retired to farming - yes I know that is not "retired"? We are a teaching farm, and I love to teach people about our livestock, I also teach art classes in ALL the fibre arts, I am a Master Spinner and working on my Master Weavers my classes range from Embroidery, to Weaving and everything in between (Spinning, Felting, Knitting, Crochet, Quilting, Dyeing, Designing etc...)While I Love Teaching, I am also open to learning and we do feel there is SO much more we can learn about Organics, that if someone want to come and stay, that has more experience than us, we are very open to learning?
